# Remi's Story: A Family's Race to Save Their Little Girl's Sight

When Kaitlyn and Simon welcomed their baby girl, Remi, into the world, they expected joy and first smiles — not fear. But within an hour of her birth, doctors diagnosed Remi with congenital glaucoma, a rare, incurable eye condition that can cause irreversible blindness.

"I had no idea what it meant," Kaitlyn recalls. "When I Googled it and saw vision loss, my heart broke. I just wanted to hold her and make it all go away."

In her first year alone, tiny Remi endured more than ten eye surgeries — including delicate procedures to insert and adjust tubes that relieve pressure inside her eyes.



Despite everything, her parents remain hopeful. "We know each operation is giving her a better chance to keep the little sight she has," Kaitlyn says.

Today, Remi can only see objects within about 30 centimetres and has no peripheral vision. Bright sunlight is painful, so she spends much of her time indoors. "The hardest part," Kaitlyn says softly, "is not knowing what her future holds."

Kaitlyn dreams of the day when no parent will have to hear that their baby is going blind. "I just want Remi to be a happy, normal kid," she says. "And to know we did everything we could."

#### **Building Stronger Connections Through Support**

Alongside the growing number of participants in our SiGHTWiSE program, our private Facebook Support Groups continue to thrive - **bringing together people** not just from across Australia, but also from the UK, Canada, USA, Africa and the Asia—Pacific region.

Our main Glaucoma Australia
Support Group has now reached
877 members, while our
Congenital and Childhood
Glaucoma Support Group has
become the largest of its kind in
the world, with over 460
members.\*

Over the past year alone, both groups have grown by an impressive 19%.

460 New Members To maintain the integrity and safety of our online communities, 133 membership requests and 26 posts were declined - helping keep our spaces free from misinformation and inappropriate content.

Each day, our Orthoptist Patient
Educators moderate discussions,
offering guidance and support
where needed. These groups have
become safe, welcoming spaces
for people to share experiences,
gain knowledge, and connect
with others who understand their
journey.

We've seen genuine friendships and support networks form, with members even organising their own education days and coffee catch-ups – a wonderful example of reimagined glaucoma care in action.

As well as providing **collaborative patient care** alongside ophthalmologists, optometrists and other health professionals, the SiGHTWiSE team plays a vital role in supporting the broader community. Through education, outreach, and personalised guidance, they empower people to take an active role in managing their eye health.

Whether it's helping someone understand their diagnosis, navigate treatment options, or adopt lifestyle changes that protect their vision, the SiGHTWiSE team is dedicated to slowing the progression of vision loss and **improving quality of life.** 

Their compassionate, community-focused approach ensures that no one faces glaucoma alone. Some of the ways which they **deliver better patient outcomes** include:

- Raising awareness and encouraging the community to get their eyes tested
- Ensuring patients comply with their treatment plan and are prepared for medical appointments
- Reducing the anxiety associated with a glaucoma diagnosis, managing uncertainty and providing mental health support
- Keeping our community informed with ongoing education, delivered on multiple channels
- Empowering patients to better understand their condition and treatment options.

Through our close partnerships with low vision service providers, we help patients access extra support, vision aids, and financial entitlements that make daily life a little easier.

We're also proud to play an active role in national, ethics-approved research studies – helping to **drive new discoveries** and shape the future of glaucoma diagnosis, treatment and care.



## **Patient Impact Survey Results**

Our Patient Impact Survey once again confirmed the powerful difference Glaucoma Australia's support makes in the lives of people living with glaucoma.

Now in its fifth year, the survey continues to show that patients who engage with our programs experience significantly better outcomes across every measure of care.

Supported patients report greater understanding of their condition, reduced anxiety, and stronger adherence to treatment and appointment schedules – all critical factors in slowing disease progression and protecting vision. These results reaffirm the importance of our education, guidance, and support programs in empowering people to take control of their glaucoma journey and maintain their quality of life.

- 92% of patients stated they attend their recommended glaucoma appointments
- 82% of patients supported by Glaucoma Australia stated they adhere to their treatment regimen, compared to 50% of unsupported patients 6 months post diagnosis compared to 37% of unsupported patients 3 years post-diagnosis\*.
- 89% of people had informed their direct relatives to get tested for glaucoma
- 53% of patients rated their knowledge of glaucoma and how it is treated as 'Excellent' or 'Above Average' after receiving support from Glaucoma Australia compared to 37% of patients who were assessed by an orthoptist educator when first joining the program
- 20% of patients reported that they 'Always' or 'Frequently' felt anxious in relation to their glaucoma compared to 36% of patients who were assessed by an orthoptist educator when first joining the program

# **Student Placement & Volunteer Programs**

In 2024/25, Glaucoma Australia continued to **strengthen its student placement and volunteer programs**, creating meaningful opportunities for learning, professional growth, and community connection.

Our student placement program maintained strong partnerships with the University of Technology Sydney (UTS) and La Trobe University (LTU) in Melbourne. UTS students played an active role throughout the year, contributing to patient education, data management, and community support initiatives.

We were also excited to partner with La Trobe University to develop a pilot Orthoptic Student Placement Program which launched in September 2025. This initiative gives emerging orthoptists valuable hands-on experience in communication and patient-centred care, further deepening their glaucoma knowledge.



Feedback from students continues to be overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing a desire to stay involved as Glaucoma Australia volunteers after completing their placements — a true reflection of the meaningful experiences gained through our programs.

Volunteers remain at the heart of our work - supporting community events, patient services, and education initiatives.



We were delighted to welcome 11 new volunteers, growing our active team from 170 to 181. Their passion and commitment have been vital in extending our reach and support to individuals and families living with glaucoma across Australia.

Looking ahead, we're focused on expanding and refining both programs. We'll continue hosting UTS students and launch the new LTU pilot program, with constant communication and supervision to ensure every student gains maximum benefit from their placement. For our volunteers, we're **prioritising stronger engagement**, **recognition**, **and training opportunities** to keep them connected and empowered.

Our Orthoptist Patient Educator Loreto Obias (pictured right) was also honored to receive the UTS Prize for the most clinical placements for Orthoptists this year.

We're also excited to announce a new physical presence for our volunteers later in 2025 at the Anterior Segment Clinic, Royal Children's Hospital (RCH) in Melbourne.

Here, volunteers will **provide information and support** to families and children affected by congenital and childhood glaucoma.

Together, we are helping to build a stronger, more connected glaucoma community, ensuring education, care, and support reach those who need it most.



### **Out and About in the Community**

In August 2024, we hosted a **Congenital and Childhood Glaucoma Brunch** on the Gold Coast, Queensland, attended by two of our Orthoptist Patient Educators, Loreto and Natasha, along with Fundraising Manager, Betty.

In November 2024, long-term volunteer Gaela Hilditch marked her **13th year of service** by hosting another successful Perth Glaucoma Support Group meeting.

The event attracted 71 attendees who enjoyed an engaging presentation by Ms Lisa Jansen on Dry Eye in Glaucoma.



In April 2025, the WA community gathered once again to hear Dr Antony Clark present on glaucoma surgeries. In recognition of Gaela's ongoing dedication and strong community participation, GA secured three years of funding from the Perth Eye Hospital to continue supporting these invaluable local events.



Glaucoma Australia extends sincere appreciation to our volunteers and Orthoptist Educators who have delivered in-person glaucoma education throughout the year - including participation at Westmead Hospital, Kingsgrove Community Centre, and major health expos and industry conferences nationwide. Highlights included World Sight Day at Parliament House, the Specsavers Clinical Care Workshop, and national representation at RANZCO 2024 and ANZGS 2025.

We were also proud to co-produce an educational glaucoma surgery video in partnership with UNSW which was featured in a leading national industry publication showcasing SiGHTWiSE.



Our ongoing collaborations with Glaucoma New Zealand (GNZ), CERA, Specsavers, Vision 2020, Vision Australia, Guide Dogs, Diabetes Australia, and the Macular Disease Foundation demonstrate our commitment to **reimagining glaucoma care** through stronger partnerships and collective action.

#### **Live Q&A Event Series**



Glaucoma Australia's **Live Q&A event series**, hosted on our YouTube channel, Glaucoma TV, continues to be one of our most popular and accessible education initiatives. Designed to keep our community **informed and empowered**, these interactive sessions provide direct access to leading clinicians, researchers, and patient advocates who share their expertise and insights on a wide range of glaucoma-related topics.

This financial year we hosted 10 Live Q&A events, attracting thousands of views from audiences across Australia and internationally. Each session explored key issues that matter most to people living with glaucoma – from understanding normal intraocular pressure (IOP) in children, to managing treatment side effects, exploring complementary therapies, and hearing first-hand patient experiences.



The popularity and ongoing engagement with Glaucoma TV highlights the community's growing appetite for **credible**, **easily accessible education**. These events not only strengthen understanding but also foster connection among viewers who appreciate the

opportunity to engage directly with experts and ask questions in real time.

Since 2006, Glaucoma Australia's **Quinlivan Research Grant Program** has been investing in cutting-edge research and empowering some of the brightest scientific minds across the country.

Through this enduring commitment, we are driving innovation,


collaboration and discovery in the field of glaucoma research. To date, we have **proudly funded 35 research grants**, contributing to a diverse range of medical and social research initiatives.

These projects have helped accelerate early detection, refine treatment options and improve the quality of life for people living with glaucoma — bringing us closer to our ultimate goal: a future free from glaucoma blindness.



Each year, on World Sight Day, new grants are awarded to outstanding researchers following a rigorous and transparent evaluation process, based on National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) standards. Every submission is carefully peer-reviewed to ensure **excellence**, **integrity**, **and impact**. Through the Quinlivan Research Grant Program, Glaucoma Australia continues to champion the research that transforms knowledge into hope, and hope into sight-saving outcomes.

Applications are assessed by Glaucoma Australia's Independent Research Panel - a group of internationally recognised experts spanning ophthalmology, optometry and pharmacy - who help us ensure that every dollar invested drives meaningful progress in glaucoma research.



## 2024 Quinlivan Research Grant Recipient

#### **Associate Professor Andrew White**

Glaucoma Australia and its Patron,
Her Excellency the Honourable

Australia, were pleased to award
the 2024 Quinlivan Research
Grant to Associate Professor
Andrew White from the Centre for
Vision Research at the Westmead
Institute for Medical Research.



A/Prof White, a clinical scientist ophthalmologist and leading glaucoma researcher, led an investigation into the potential of Irbesartan - an existing anti-inflammatory drug - as a new treatment to **protect retinal cells** and slow glaucoma progression.



"Sight is precious, and an Australia free from glaucoma blindness is an important goal," the Governor-General said at the announcement. "Andrew's dedication to advancing glaucoma research represented the very best of our nation."



Glaucoma Australia CEO Adam Check congratulated A/Prof White, noting that "his innovative work offered hope to the 20% of glaucoma patients for whom current treatments were not enough."

The Quinlivan Research Grants are awarded annually following rigorous peer review, made possible through the generosity of our donors.

"I've got beautiful grandchildren, and I can't imagine not being able to see their little faces because I'm such a visual person."



## **Quinlivan Research Appeal**

This year's appeal was about raising funds for glaucoma research to support families like Kaitlyn and Simon's, whose baby daughter, Remi, was born with congenital glaucoma, a rare and irreversible eye condition that can lead to permanent vision loss.

It shared the emotional story of Remi's diagnosis, her intensive medical journey, including multiple surgeries, and the daily challenges she faces with severely limited



The appeal highlighted the urgent need for safer, more effective treatments and potential cures for glaucoma, reminding us that research is our strongest hope in the fight against vision loss.

It underscored the critical role of ongoing scientific discovery in protecting sight – not just for today's patients, but for future generations. For children like Remi, research offers the promise of a brighter future – one where glaucoma no longer threatens their ability to see, learn, and experience the world around them.

By sharing this story, we encouraged donations to the Quinlivan Research Fund, which supports cutting-edge research projects aiming to develop lifechanging glaucoma treatments and ultimately find a cure.

The emotionally compelling call to action was designed to move hearts and inspire generosity – urging supporters to fund vital glaucoma research that brings hope to children and families living with the disease. By giving, supporters become part of something truly life-changing; helping to protect precious sight, ease the burden on families, and create a brighter, more hopeful future for generations to come.
